How do you think we should celebrate and encourage leadership among students at our school? What leadership qualities do you think are most important to highlight?

Lucinda: I think that leadership should be available to students at a younger age, giving them the skills and experience to fulfill their roles better in senior year levels. I think that educating people on the benefits of being in leadership and the lessons learnt will further encourage people to step up and be leaders. Talking to them about how having a role in leaderships looks good towards employers but also how the skills that you are strengthening will also benefit you in the workplace. Leadership gualities that I think are most important to highlight are being someone who is approachable, genuine, bubbly and courageous. With these things in hand you are well on the way to making a difference.

Thomas: I think the most important leaders are often those without a title or role. Leadership doesn't just involve telling people what to do, it is encouraging others and wanting the best for the community. This is the type of leadership that should be encouraged at school through praise for the little actions that make our Nagle community great. For me, the most important quality is listening to the people around you. We aren't in leadership for ourselves, we are in leadership to help out others and represent the students.

Alivia: Continue to have the leaders active in the school community, especially in the younger years and acknowledge people within the school that show good leadership qualities. Qualities I think are the most important is to lead by example and be an approachable, caring and opened minded listener who wants the best for everyone.

Harry: I think that our school recognises leadership amongst the students by acknowledging students hard work and their leadership qualities with merits at merit assembles. I think that students need to be honest have strong moral principles. Another leadership quality that is important is communication. It is important to share ideas to others.

Lucinda: Most rewarding is the memories I get to make with fellow leadership members and those from other schools who are in the same boat I am. It is great to connect with likeminded people and have the same vision in our minds.
